I have lived in University Hills for almost 15 years. I am with the Department of Civil and Environmental Engineering, doing research and teaching in transportation and traffic engineering, transportation planning, and site development. For the past two years, I have managed a year-long senior design course addressing all aspects of land development in real planning areas in the City of Irvine. I've been associated with UCI's Institute of Transportation Studies for over 25 years. For the last 10 years, I have served on the Citizen Advisory Committee of the Orange County Transportation Authority. I served on the Faculty Senate Committee on Land Use and Environment for most of the 1990s, chairing it for 5 of those years (and as chair, I also served on the oddly-named Campus Physical and Environmental Committee). During this time, this committee (a) reduced the land take by the TCA for the toll road saving the highest point in the Ecological Preserve, (b) monitored campus development impacting U-Hills, and (c) lobbied to remove a direct link between Gabriellino and Newport Coast Drive. I've served on the California Avenue Review Task Force and the East Campus Planning Advisory Committee. I've worked with the Office of Campus and Environmental Planning on several projects over the years. Each of these roles has dealt with the physical development of the campus and of University Hills. My family and I make active use of amenities in the U-Hills community. My interests in HRB are, not surprisingly, the maintenance and continuing development of University Hills as a community.

HRB Election
